**About the Trinity River Corridor Project:**

**THE TRINITY**

The projected \$2 billion Trinity River Corridor Project is the largest public works and urban development project in the history of Dallas, and one of the largest of its type in the nation. It will reduce flood damage, provide recreational amenities and add visionary environmental benefits, improve downtown traffic congestion, and encourage development along the Trinity River. The Trinity River Audubon Center opened November 2008 and the staff has already welcomed over 32,000 people to the center. The Lower Chain of Wetlands is complete and progress is underway on Moore Park Gateway Phase I and Trinity Trail Phase I. The Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge being built alongside the Continental Avenue Bridge and designed by internationally known architect Santiago Calatrava is now under construction with the first shipment of steel in Texas; and in 2011, construction will begin on the second Calatrava designed bridge, the Margaret McDermott Bridge.
