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**PUBLIC INVITED TO COMMUNITY WORKSHOP**  
**ON TRINITY RIVER CORRIDOR LAND USE PLAN**

As part of the planning process for the Trinity River Corridor Project, a Community Workshop will be held on Saturday, March 9. Dallas residents are encouraged to attend the event that will be held in the auditorium of the Yvonne A. Ewell Townview Center (1201 East 8<sup>th</sup> Street), from 9 a.m. until noon.

During the three-hour workshop, team members from HNTB Corporation will report their findings of a land use study conducted on both sides of the Trinity River in Dallas. Citizen stakeholders will then be asked to provide their input into long-range visions for the Trinity River Corridor and options for development along the Trinity Parkway alignments. This important effort will determine what the corridor and the communities near the river should look like in 50 to 60 years.

“The Community Workshop on March 9<sup>th</sup> will end our latest series of seventeen stakeholder meetings that were held all along the Trinity River corridor in Dallas during late February and early March,” said Rebecca Dugger, Director of the Trinity River Corridor Project. “As with those public sessions, citizens will have an opportunity to provide feedback on land use concepts for their areas, possible designs for business centers and residential areas, and other study materials during the Community Workshop.”

The public’s input will influence the final long-term Comprehensive Land Use Plan that will be adopted by the Dallas City Council.

The Trinity River Corridor Land Use Plan is one in a series of coordinated efforts the City of Dallas is carrying out to promote economic growth by protecting and enhancing one of the areas most valuable assets—the Trinity River. In 1998, Dallas voters approved a \$246 million capital bond program known as the Trinity River Corridor Project. When completed, the Trinity River Corridor Project will increase flood protection, improve traffic congestion in the downtown area, encourage development of the lands along the river, as well as provide recreational amenities and environmental benefits.
